Course Abstract:

II. Learning Results

The goal of this course is to equip students with a basic knowledge about the multifaceted socio-economic and cultural process known as globalization, developing their ability to assess the major arguments concerning its consequences. This is achieved through the examination of questions such as: What is globalization? How is it manifested? What drives it? What determines the distribution of gains and losses arising from globalization? The course finally provides a more robust understanding of how human society adapts to, profits from or reacts against this process. It examines Globalization from a multifaceted perspective – the historical, political, economic, human rights, environmental, technological, art and cultural, linguistic, migratory, identity and development issues affecting today's globalized world.

III. Teaching Methodology

Lectures, case study discussions, student presentations and audio-visual clips to help students better understand various concepts. Information will be provided from a variety of sources, including reading assignments, short written assignments, internet web pages, and video clips.

Each student's performance will be closely monitored though active participation in classroom discussions, assignments, a presentation and a final evaluation. Evaluations will be focused on the student's ability to apply the materials to real and hypothetical cases/problems.
