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Course Description

The course is aimed at students who have a general command of the language, enough to communicate in familiar everyday situations. The objective of this course is that students can perform in a wider spectrum of everyday situations and acquire the minimum skills necessary to perform in the academic and work environments. The course promotes the development of strategies to solve the difficulties experienced by the speaker with a limited vocabulary. The course aims to take advantage of the opportunity for language immersion and daily contact with the language to maximize Spanish learning outcomes and to promote knowledge of the cultural patterns of Argentina.

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to talk about everyday events and work; describe and narrate experiences and events in detail; express wishes and expectations; recount the plots of books or films and express personal impressions of them; express plans and opinions; give and receive instructions and recommendations. They will be able to write and understand brief reports and personal letters, extract information from general interest brochures and recognize the main ideas of short texts. They will be able to understand conversations conducted at a slow pace and the central argument of simple films

Course Requirements

Students must attend at least 85% of the class sessions to remain in good standing. One can have up to two unjustified absences without affecting the final grade. Tardiness (arriving more than ten minutes late or leaving before class has ended) will be considered half an absence. The only way to justify an absence is to present a medical certificate by the time of the next scheduled class after the absence.

When a student is absent, it is his or her responsibility to contact classmates or the teacher to get any assignments and then complete them by the next class. However, it is up to the teacher whether or not to accept work that is submitted late (having missed the previous class does not justify not fulfilling the assigned task).

Students are expected to participate actively in the classes and make an oral presentation whose subject and date will be agreed upon with the teacher.
