

THE IMAGE OF BARCELONA IN LITERATURE Mediterranean Studies

Course contact hours: 45 Recommended credits: 6 ECTS – 3 US

OBJECTIVES

After the Olympic Games of 1992, Barcelona became known to the world as an international tourist destination; but a short tourist visit cannot account for the cultural complexities of the Catalan capital. In order to know any city, to "dwell' in it, we need to become familiar with its oral history, paintings, architecture, sculpture, and literary texts. More specifically, the more we learn about the literature of Barcelona, the more we shall know about its cultural past and present. With this aim in mind, this course will explore the city through the eyes of its writers. We shall start in the nineteenth century with the rise of the modern metropolis that we know today and finish with the post-Olympic urban reality of the twenty-first century. Students will encounter a wide variety of materials - poetry, novel, theater and essay - and will be expected to study them with a critical eye, applying additional historical, cultural and theoretical readings. Our goal will be to arrive at a greater knowledge of the city and its context, as well as the literature surrounding it.

REQUIREMENTS

Fluent English Interest in literature

1. Gain a general understanding of Spanish and Catalan history, culture and society

2. Analyze a text and conduct a close reading

3. Understand better some 20th Century ideologies and historical concepts.

4. Get to know more about the city in which they are spending their semester abroad: Barcelona.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

Classes will be conducted in lecture style but will promote participation and debate at every moment. The instructor will start by asking students about the previous lecture in order to assess what did they understand and encourage them to be active in their learning. During the sessions of close reading of texts students will have to lead the class and explain what did they think of the text and why.

ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

Mid-term exam: 25% In class essay: 35% Final Exam: 35% Class participation 10%

Midterm Exam (25%): This exam will consist of a series of questions that ask students to demonstrate their comprehension of the material covered in class.

In class essay (35%): Students will be asked to read the novel Nada by Carmen Laforet (a copy of it will be posted online. In class they will be required to answer questions about it in the form of an essay.

Final Exam (30%): This exam will consist of a series of questions that ask students to demonstrate their comprehension of the material covered in class in addition to their capacity for in-depth textual analysis.

Class Participation (10%): P Each student must participate (pertinently) at least 10 times during the semester in order to get the full mark,

There will be a Course Reader posted on SAM containing all the texts that the student needs for the class as well as the novel Nada by Carmen Laforet that they also need to read.
